From the Ontario South Area Chairperson

Hello Members of Ontario South,

I can't believe that as I'm typing this report, we're already past the middle of July! The past several months have been busy and productive.

Areas of focus have included:

Executive Meetings: The Executive Committee has met virtually three times since the in-person handover meeting in January. Our July meeting this past weekend was in-person and started Friday evening and continued all day Saturday and into the evening again, finishing just past 9 pm! The big focus of the meeting was reviewing and planning the agenda for Assembly 2024 and the bid for Assembly 2025. Other topics of discussion included the Executive and Coordinator reports, suggested revisions to the OSA Policies and Guidelines Manual, and questions, concerns and suggestions from

members. Between old and new business, we covered 36 agenda items, and an additional 11 Items for Consideration. That is a lot of discussion! By our dinner break, I was very tired and excused myself, missing diner, to reinvigorate with a hot shower – and I was encouraged to take that time for self-care.

<u>AWSC 2024</u>: AWSC was held May 24-26 at Durham College. A lot of time and effort, by all members of the Executive Committee, went into creating the information package and building the agenda. It was both a nerve-wracking and exciting experience to chair the first AWSC of this term of service! Evaluation Forms have been compiled and members' feedback has been reviewed and considered for future AWSC meetings.

<u>Items for Consideration</u>: Thank you to those members who have put forward Items for Consideration. Members will receive a response following the Executive meeting at which the Item was discussed. Several were on the agenda for the July Executive meeting. Responses, where possible, will be published in the next edition of the Open Lines Newsletter.

Assembly 2024: Assembly is planned for October 18-20, at the Four Points Sheraton in the village of Point Edward (near Sarnia). Planning is well under way. I am participating with the Assembly Host Committee and meeting monthly. The Assembly information package and agenda will be finalized for distribution in mid-August. Assembly 2024 will include an election for Alternate Delegate. Resumes for the position of Alternate Delegate should be forwarded to me by 01August to be included in the Assembly information package. If you're interested, but have missed the deadline, please reach out me! There is still time. I'm learning so much at our Executive meetings about some of the intangibles of the fellowship – there is growth outside of the comfort zone, the benefits of asking for help, the power of the Serenity Prayer and the moment of silence preceding it, the acceptance found in sharing my real self with others; and that participating in principle-based discussions using our Legacies (whether at the Executive table, AWSC or Assembly) leads to decisions that feel right for Al-Anon. And despite the fatigue, I can find the joy in service. I'm grateful for the opportunity to serve Area 86.

Hello Ontario South. This is my first report as your incoming secretary. We have been hard at work in Ontario South in this first half of 2024. It seems like a lot has happened in this short period of time and it sure doesn't feel like only 6 months.

I have attended 2 scheduled executive meetings, one in January, which is the handover meeting from the outgoing executive and coordinators to the incoming, and the next in March, which was electronic. In addition, we have held 3 additional ad-hoc meetings to discuss items which we felt could not wait until the next scheduled meeting. I have done minutes for all of them.

We're preparing for the next executive meeting, to be held July 19-21 in person. There is a lot on the agenda for that meeting, not the least of which is to prepare the Assembly 2024 package.

I continue to respond to emails, forwarding information as requested.

I maintain the contact list and send it out approximately monthly. There are always changes more often, but I don't want to flood people's in-boxes.

I attended my first AWSC as secretary, helped with registration, took minutes, and sent out the same. There are a few other administrative tasks involved with AWSC 2024 yet to be done, including the evaluation forms organized into a summary. Thanks to everyone who completed one.

I sent a redacted copy of AWSC minutes to the website coordinator for posting on the website.

Also, a copy of the redacted Assembly 2023 minutes has been sent to the website coordinator and should be up soon on the website.

All in all, it's a steady stream of duties and must fit into my full-time work schedule, but weirdly, I love it! I'm organized, and getting more so, as I learn and do this role, and I love the contact with people that I haven't yet met and being of service.

- It is important to note that postage plays a role in determining the pricing for all literature orders filled by the LDC.
- We discuss closure dates for the summer and winter seasons. We arrive at the dates chosen based on past-history
 of sales activity during the proposed dates.
- Another item we discuss, is the cut-off dates for ordering literature to be brought to AWSC and Assembly to save the groups postage.

- It is important to remember that if you are ordering for an electronic group there needs to be a physical address & a postal code in the OSA Area.
- Thank you to the members of OSA for ordering your Conference Approved Literature from your LDC. We rely on your orders and your continued to support to keep our LDC financially secure.



We had 19 teens attend ORC 2024 and 12 teens attend Trillium 2024. Both conferences were a success thanks to two special AMIASs who worked very hard: Louise O and Martha S respectively.

Positions for Alateen Coordinator and Alateen Advisor for ORC 2025 have been filled. We are still looking for volunteers to fill the Alateen Coordinator and Alateen Advisor for ORC 2026; these positions start now as they will be shadowing ORC 2025 Committee members. As you may have noticed, we are sending out an announcement looking for Al-Anon members to register as AMIAS (Al-Anon Members in Alateen Service) to help grow Alateen. This is the proposed workflow for the APM updates.

At Durham College there is a water fountain. On one of your breaks, it's worth the walk to see it and have lunch nearby.

A newly registering electronic group's first contact is the Area Group Records Coordinator (AGRC). The AGRC may be able to assist in identifying other groups in D33 and who the GRs might be. The groups within the D33 are encouraged to 'talk to each other and reason things out.' The Delegate has responded to the member in District 33 and told her he needs to reach out to the temporary electronic groups with information he received from the World Service level and that her doing so would drift into double-headed management. The anticipated expense will be shared by each group and District in the Area as they each recognize their individual and collective responsibility. The GRs attending the Assembly should come prepared to discuss and vote on the Area budget.' Such a purchase is therefore not an administrative decision but rather an Assembly discussion and collective decision.

This Committee should be formed of interested members of Area 86 who are interested in completing service to the website.	As an Area Coordinator and trusted servant, you are accountable for the role. If assistance is required to fulfil your obligations, you have the autonomy to invite other members to assist you. Duties of such a committee do not have to be written and added to the OSA Policies and Guidelines Manual. Because the Alternate Delegate is your liaison to the Executive Committee, it would be recommended that the Alternate Delegate be invited and/or apprised of your activities and any issues. 

Al-Anon Information Services(AIS) Ottawa (District 28) reports the following for the year 2023/24

- Maintained a 7 day per week telephone answering service 0900 hrs-2100 hrs. daily
- Maintained the Ottawa Al-Anon website. Planning a re-fresh of website based upon feedback from District
- Launched the Sunday Speaker Open Meeting (SSOM) move to in-person. New location with concurrent AA meeting. Every 2nd Sunday of the month. Good 7th Tradition contributions.
- Maintained meeting lists of Al-Anon Family Groups in Ottawa and surrounding areas in printable and online formats.
- Provided outreach activities including literature at AA in person events
- Maintained the AIS email service i.e. receive and answer inquiries, distribute emails and event information as required.
- Completed a full inventory of AIS Conference Approved Literature (CAL) and supply to conferences and events as needed.
- Project a positive balance at year end primarily due to the move back to in-person for Sunday Speaker Open Meeting (SSOM).
- Connected with 2 surrounding Districts 26 and 30 to explore collaboration and support.
- Developed a Public Outreach plan and monitoring of progress with the plan.

Highlights:

Sunday Speaker Open Meeting (SSOM): In the Fall of 2023, AIS developed a proposal for District outlining the current situation regarding the SSOM. A proposal was developed by AIS and presented to District outlining the current situation and possible options for in-person versus online meetings, frequency of the meeting, venue and scheduling. A survey of GRs was also conducted to determine whether members preferred an online or in-person scenario, which frequency was preferred, and whether a concurrent AA meeting was desired. Following consultation and discussion at the District level, a decision was made to return to in-person meetings in 2024 with a frequency of two Sundays per month. A suitable venue was found and the inperson meeting was launched in January 2024. To date the meeting has been a success. Groups are now scheduled with less frequency. This has been a welcome change for the groups, from the former scenario of 4 meetings to be chaired per year.

The SSOM will be assessed in June 2024 to determine whether frequency, venue, etc. is working well. There is a concurrent AA meeting which has been beneficial for families who wish to attend both meetings at the same time. AA has been generous to share their storage area with Al-Anon for literature and meeting materials.

Mamisarvik Healing Centre

Mamisarvik Healing Centre in Ottawa requested a series of 6 Al-Anon meetings to introduce the centre's clients to the Al-Anon program; and to illustrate how a meeting operates. This was a wonderful opportunity for our Al-Anon members to participate in an Al-Anon meeting at a Inuit Healing Centre. Meetings were chaired by interested Al-Anon members and clients participated as they wished. Al-Anon members also had an opportunity to witness an Inuit welcoming ceremony.

Literature:

A full inventory of AIS literature was completed and items requiring purchase were identified. This has enabled AIS to provide an extensive selection of materials at local conferences.

2023/24 Outreach projects:

1. Eighty (80) outreach packages for Ottawa Al-Anon members to use for distribution within the city. These packages will contain the *Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism* booklet, a bookmark and poster as needed. The packages will be made available at Ottawa Al-Anon Day 2024.

- 2. Participation at the City of Ottawa Working on Wellness Festival (WOW) 2023.
- 3. Support to AMIAS- in reaching out to teens at schools and community organizations that provide services to teens through posters and also direct contact with school counselors.
- 4. Literature table at local Vanier Round Up.
- 5. WSO Public Service Announcements distribution to local radio stations.

Challenges for 2024:

The recruitment of volunteers to the committee remains problematic. Rotation of service is desired and needed and presently the committee functions with fewer committee members than is optimal.

At this time, several positions remain vacant and some committee members are performing multiple roles. Continued reports are made to District to inform GRs about the committee progress and the current positions available. Service positions are listed on the website for interested members to review as well.

Greater Toronto Al-Anon/Alateen Information Service

Hello, my name is Di B and I'm the Alternate Chair of the Greater Toronto Al-Anon/Alateen Information Service (or GTAIS for short).

This year the GTAIS sponsored a public outreach booth at the Pri-Med Conference in Mississauga from May 8-10th. The Pri-Med Conference is an international medical conference for family doctors, nurse practitioners, and other medical professionals. Our booth was manned by 16 volunteers who came from as far away as London and Cobourg to help out during the 3 days. The volunteers again commented this year about how surprised they were that so few medical professionals knew about Al-Anon or the effects Alcoholism has on the family members. Although the cost to attend this conference may pose a barrier to attending in the future, it was clear that we still need to put more effort in to educating the medical professionals about Al-Anon. To that end we have reached out to the organizers of the Pri-Med Conference and asked if we could be one of the speakers at the conference in the future, we are still awaiting a reply.

On behalf of the GTAIS I want to thank all the committee members and volunteers who helped make this another very successful Al-Anon public outreach initiative.

The GTAIS is looking for Al-Anon members who have been in the program for at least 3 years who would be interested in being part of our telephone answering service. This service position can be done from the comfort of your own home. We would especially like to have some volunteers who can speak more than one language.
